PYCP is rooted in the local community and is committed to enabling each young person to realise their unique potential and to take a positive role in society.
















However, the building had been poorly constructed and the group looked to Urban Aid funding to give the building a face lift and create a base with a longer lifespan! The Greater Pilton Streetwork Team also became residents of the centre at this time. Ironically, the new building was situated on top of where PAPA first began its fight for play facilities within Pilton although now it had a new name, Pilton Association for Play Activities.

Pilton Youth Project was set up as an Intermediate Treatment project for over 12's and was funded directly by social work services. Its main remit was delivering intensive support to young people at risk. Following a merger with PAPA (Under 12's), the combined organisation was established in its present form in 1997 as a Scottish Charity and became a company limited by guarantee in 2002.















Looking to the future......

PYCP has a long history in the local community, it is a project that was started by local people for local people. There have been many changes over the years; new buildings, new faces, new names but it still has the same aims at the heart - the children and young people of the community.

Being involved in the project has impacted on the lives of many people and indeed individual people have shaped and continue to shape the work of PYCP.
